## Concept

Ukraine's recovery is not only about rebuilding infrastructure. It is about rebuilding human capital, restoring communities, strengthening resilience, and creating the conditions for long-term economic growth and stability.

As Ukraine advances on its EU accession pathway, recovery efforts present a unique opportunity to build a modern, future-oriented society aligned with European values and standards.

**The human dimension of recovery will be critical to the country's long-term competitiveness, workforce participation, demographic resilience, and investment environment.**

Millions of Ukrainians have been directly affected by the war, including veterans, displaced populations, women-led households, persons with disabilities, families facing new barriers to participation in society and the economy. At the same time, businesses, local authorities, and recovery actors are navigating challenges linked to labour shortages, reconstruction, service delivery, and community resilience.

Recovery efforts that place people at the centre deliver stronger and more sustainable outcomes. Future-proof recovery efforts will strengthen labour market participation, support return and reintegration, and improve investment sustainability.





Human-centred recovery must therefore be embedded across reconstruction planning, financing, infrastructure, governance, and service delivery. Investments made today will shape Ukraine's future workforce, competitiveness, and social cohesion for decades to come.

**Future-proof recovery also creates significant opportunities for businesses and investors.** Companies integrating accessibility, inclusive design, and user-centred approaches into reconstruction, infrastructure, housing, technology, transport, and service delivery will be better positioned to access emerging markets, strengthen workforce resilience, improve talent retention, align with evolving European standards, and deliver more sustainable long-term investments. Recovery solutions designed to meet the needs of Ukrainians will not only support social resilience, but also drive innovation, usability, and competitiveness across sectors.

**This is particularly important for veteran reintegration, workforce recovery, and demographic resilience.** Ukrainians will only return and reinvest in their communities if they can access housing, transport, employment, education, healthcare, and public services that enable full participation in society and the economy.

A recovery that is resilient, locally grounded, and future-oriented will be stronger, more competitive, and more sustainable. Investing in people is not only aligned with European values and international commitments. It is smart economics, good governance, and a strategic investment in Ukraine's long-term recovery and stability.
